

LET US VOTE



Let Us Vote is a petition drive launched by Nebraska Family Alliance requiring the Lincoln City Council to rescind a gender identity bathroom ordinance or put it on the ballot for a vote.

On February 14th, the Lincoln City Council adopted an ordinance redefining “sex” to mean “male, female, neither, or both,” including but “not limited to sexual orientation and gender identity.”

This ordinance ignores both common sense and the will of the people.

Registered voters in Lincoln have until February 28th to sign a petition requiring the city council to rescind the ordinance or put it on the ballot for a vote.



TAKE ACTION

- 1. SIGN THE PETITION:** Visit the NFA office to sign the petition by February 28th or look for petition circulators canvassing the city.
- 2. VOLUNTEER:** Call NFA if you would like to help circulate petitions and collect signatures.
- 3. SHARE:** Tell your friends, family, and church about the petition drive, and urge them to sign.

FAQs

HOW WILL THE ORDINANCE AFFECT MY FAMILY, BUSINESS, AND CHURCH?

- Men who profess a female identity must have open access to women’s bathrooms and locker rooms in all businesses open to the public, private schools, youth sports leagues, and even churches.
- It threatens business owners with devastating financial liability and empowers the government to punish citizens with Biblical beliefs on marriage and sexuality.
- Due to the ordinance’s broad reach and ill-defined, unverifiable definition of “sex,” a business or non-profit could be guilty of violating the law for failing to use someone’s preferred pronouns or for preventing men who self-identify as women from entering women’s bathrooms.
- You could be liable for creating a “hostile work environment” for expressing Biblical beliefs on marriage and sexuality.
- Businesses and churches allowing outside groups to use their building could be forced to allow events or promote ideas that violate their beliefs.

WHAT IS THE REFERENDUM PETITION ABOUT?

The petition is simply about letting Lincoln voters decide the issue instead of seven city council members.

A successful referendum petition in 2012 required the city council to rescind a similar ordinance or put it on the ballot. The city council never did. Now, they are attempting to enforce a new ordinance without a vote.
